NET LOSSES

Hockey hates a weak loonie. While the Canadian dollar has rallied recently, it remains well below parity, last reached in early 2013. About one-third of the league's revenues are generated in Canada, and as the loonie declines, those income streams all become less lucrative when converted to U.S. dollars. Since total revenues are divided 50-50 between the league and its players, the pressure from a declining currency trickles down to every NHL paycheque. This year, players are expected to forfeit 17% of their salaries to escrow, a portion of which is typically refunded when accounts are reconciled in the off-season. "We're advising our players not to expect a refund this year," says Matthew Bacchiochi, a portfolio manager at Gavin Management Group, which manages money for several players. /Tim Shufelt
